

LABOUR IN PARLIAMENT CLIVE LEWIS MP NORWICH SOUTH

This government's response to this pandemic has been bungled, partial and incoherent.

MPs' offices have had to work extremely hard to get wrongs righted for local people and employers by continually cajoling and scrutinising ministers and their departments. More intensive but not so different from our work in pre-COVID times.

However, in Parliament, a lot of things have changed.

For the last couple of months, another MP has voted by proxy for me in the House of Commons chamber. That's because as, a black person, I'm in a COVID-vulnerable category.

I'm still able to participate in questions via video link, but the government excludes MPs in my position from debates. So while I've still been able to get some important constituency and national topics discussed, the time available to raise issues in the chamber has been vastly reduced.

LABOUR MUST BE THE VOICE OF THE SELF-EMPLOYED

Community union are a proud champion of the five million strong self-employed and freelance community across the UK.

For many people, self-employment is the answer to finding a good work-life balance. It can be extremely rewarding, but it can also mean longer hours, less pay and more worry about your finances. We're a trade union that's here to help and support self-employed workers.

During the pandemic, the self-employed community have been hit particularly hard. According to the Resolution Foundation almost half of self-employed people have lost work, whether for economic reasons (such as a lack of demand and lockdown restrictions) or health or caring reasons (including self-isolation, shielding, and childcare).

they have not qualified for help from the government's Self-Employment Income Support Scheme and are suffering real financial hardship as a result. They feel like the forgotten self-employed.

We're continuing to call on the Chancellor to extend the scheme to those currently missing out such as the newly self-employed, those who earn less than 50% of their income from self-employment, and those who are directors of limited companies. We're also calling for kick start loans for the self-employed to help our economic recovery.

Too many people are in devastating circumstances and there should be no further delay to getting them the help they need.

Labour Local Government in the Eastern Region is faced with the biggest set of elections ever in May 2021.

All the elections that should have been fought in 2020 will be held with the County Council elections in Hertfordshire, Essex, Suffolk, Norfolk and Cambridgeshire. BATTLEGROUND FOCUS: PETERBOROUGH

It is hard to find a better example of a true Labour/Tory bellwether constituency than the cathedral city of Peterborough.

Since 1974, the seat has changed hands six times, and in ten of the last twelve general elections the party that has won Peterborough has gone on to form a government. You could say that the path to power runs through Peterborough.

The people of Peterborough have been failed by ten years of national Tory rule and decades of Tory-led councils. Crime has gone up, school budgets have been slashed and fly tipping has become a blight on the area. A Labour government would transform Peterborough with better schools, cleaner streets and safer communities.

The Tories won back Peterborough in December's general election by 2,580 votes. Winning the city is crucial to winning the next general election, getting Keir into Downing Street and delivering for the people of Peterborough.

MAKE FRIENDS WITH YOUR LOCAL MEDIA

CARL MORRIS - REGIONAL COMMUNICATIONS OFFICER

The focus of local media is quickly evolving from print to online - but it's still local.

The conventional press release has a vital role to play - it's the starting point for engagement and your message delivery strategy.

A successful press release will be concise, easily transferable in to the newspaper, deliver our key messages succinctly, contain quotes from a spokesperson, any stats should be well sourced and evidenced and your release should be accompanied by good quality photographs.

But by the time your press release is ready you will:

- have already pitched the local relevance and importance of your news to the local reporter;
- know your message and rehearsed how best to deliver it;
- have a plan to share the content on your own platforms

Getting to know the reporters at your local outlet is key. What stories do they





like to cover? When's their deadline? Do they like to attend events in person or would the prefer a release with photos? Your job is to make the journalist's job as easy as possible.

You also need to remember that your local reporter is as likely to have a camera and a microphone, as a notepad and pencil – so be prepared to be filmed!
